From the Superintendent

Hello everyone, I'm hoping that you are all enjoying the spring weather as much as I am. After a pretty miserable February, a little sunshine is just what the doctor ordered. We have many new developments going on at Wishram School, and we are thrilled to have the opportunity to share those with you. We have great news pertaining to our North facing gymnasium wall, and our shop facility. We also have a prominent staff member retirement approaching, and some changes coming to our staffing alignment that we want to bring to your attention. With each new change brings opportunity, and we are very excited about what the future is going to bring to Wishram School District.

As many of you may know, our exterior gymnasium wall recently had some testing completed to assess its structural integrity. While the test didn't uncover any immediate danger, the results indicated that something needed to be done within the foreseeable future to avoid becoming a safety hazard. Mr. Churchwell and I spent a lot of time with state level officials, structural

engineers, and architects. We also carried out a fair amount of grant writing in hopes of finding a solution, and we were blown over when we received \$3.6 million from the states small school modernization program. This will cover the vast majority of the cost to replace the wall. We also received a \$150,000 grant to renovate our existing shop to carry out more career and technical education programming for our students. These two developments mean tremendous things for the future of Wishram School.

One of our beloved staff members has decided that this will be their last year as a certificated instructor at our school. For those who haven't heard, Mr. Pickette, our longtime 5th and 6th grade teacher has decided to retire after roughly 3 decades of service to our students. While this is difficult news, we certainly wish him well in his future endeavors, and thank him for all that he has done for students, staff, and community.



With Mr. Pickette's departure, an opportunity has presented itself that will change the way we operate, while we continue our efforts to provide our students with increased access and equity when compared to other schools throughout the state. We are going to be moving our 6th grade students into the middle school, and creating a full-time Career and Technical Education teacher position. This change required serious sacrifice on behalf of all of our staff members here at Wishram, but we found that increasing our instructional capacities for our learners is a priority worthy of making these alterations. Beginning next year, our elementary staffing will be coordinated as follows: K/1st grade- Ms. Guthrie, 2nd/3rd grade- Mrs. Shinn, and 4th/5th grade will be taught by Mrs. Ringer. The secondary team has added 6th grade to their course load, so they will also be making some pretty significant changes to their instruction, curriculum, and schedule. Pre-School will still be offered, and we are currently searching for a caring and creative classified employee who will meet our students' needs. While these changes present some challenges, our students, and their futures are worth the potential hardship. Our CTE program will focus on vocational skills such as woodshop, computer programming, small engines, and much more. We are currently looking for a talented, outgoing, dedicated instructor to head this program, so if you know of anyone, please inform them of this crucial open position.

As you can likely see, we have some very exciting things happening at Wishram School District #94, and we are already busy planning for the 2019/2020 school year. We would like to thank our parents, and community members for everything that you do to help our students attain success. As always, it is an honor and a privilege to serve as your district leader, and please don't hesitate to reach out to me directly if you have any questions. The best has yet to come.

Secondary Math

A small group of Wishram secondary students recently competed in the Columbia Gorge Wind Challenge. This is an event put on by the Gorge Technology Alliance along with Google and the Columbia Gorge Community College.

During this event, students learn about wind turbine technology and design. They apply their engineering skills in creating a turbine that will not only produce electricity, but lift a weight in a mechanical engineering test as well. This is an all-day competition. They arrive at 8:30 and start building right away. With the help of college student mentors, they build and test their turbines. At 11:30 all turbines are set aside and the competition begins. They are tested to see how much voltage they can produce and how quickly they can lift the weight. After the first competition, students are allowed to re-engineer their turbines to see if they can improve on their design in any way. They are then put through a second round of competition. Their best results are used for a final score. While the Wishram Gust Busters didn't make it in the top three, we did end up in the top 10 high school teams that were entered. Our team consisted of both junior high and high school students. The team was successful in both endeavors, generating a little over .55V of power and lifting the weight in 7.00 seconds. Congratulations goes out to the Wishram Gust Busters for a job well done!

Other news:

Junior High students in my Navigation 101 class recently completed their "Student-led Conferences." All 7th & 8th graders (but one) presented a slide show along with samples of their best work during conference week (March 26 – March 28). These presentations were given in front of their parents as well as quite a number of teachers (and administration in some cases). My guys will be working over the spring break beautifying the grounds and the inside of the building. Facilities:

I thought I'd leave this great news in this article. Great news has fell upon the little school of Wishram. In past newsletters I informed the community about the unfortunate situation with our North wall and how the cost to fix it was well over 3 million dollars. Mr. Roberts and I wrote a grant to the State of Washington requesting \$3,567,854 dollars. We were told by almost everyone at the state level that the chances of our little school receiving the grant were basically non existent. Mr. Roberts and I pounded the pavement and made 100's of phone calls and to our surprise Wishram School was awarded \$3,567,854 dollars, yes that is three million, five hundred sixty seven thousand, eight hundred and fifty four dollars. We are so grateful to the State of Washington as we were 1 of 73 schools who applied for the grant funding, There was only \$15,349,000 to give and the amount requested by the 73 different schools was over \$120 Million Dollars and yet we were granted 30% of the 15 Million available. Now the real work will begin. We have an architect hired and are currently

weeding our way through the red tape. If everything works out, we will be going out to bid in the near future and construction will start this summer.

We are looking for a great candidate to fill our new CTE position. Wishram School desperately needs someone who can bring shop/welding/small engine repair/CAD, Etc to our little school. If you feel you are the correct candidate for this position, please do not hesitate to apply for this position.
